

As a Sixth Former you must be committed to your studies for the duration of your course, behave in a manner that demonstrates kindness and maturity, setting a good example to younger students at all times. We expect all Sixth Formers to have a positive impact upon their community. Here are the conditions of your Study Programme:

- I will commit to my Study Programme, be punctual, maintain excellent attendance and work to the best of my ability.
- 2. I understand that I am committing to study qualifications for two years.
- If I am absent due to illness, I must communicate this with a phone call to the school absence line by my parent or carer. For long absences, medical evidence should be provided.
- 4, My attendance must be 95% or above. Failure to maintain this without medical evidence is unsatisfactory and will result in removal from subjects, intervention plans or paying for exam fees.
- 5. I will dress appropriately for a school environment.
- Phone use will be sensible and appropriate, I won't allow it to cause issues with my peers or interrupt learning and I will not use it blatantly in front of younger students.
- 7. I will make sure I am committed to my studies by:
  - Using holiday time for holidays
  - Being punctual every day
  - Studying in my study periods
  - Investing at least 5 hours per week of private study per subject
  - Keeping part-time employment to a maximum of 15 hours per week.
  - Organising myself, my work and keeping to deadlines.
  - · Being determined and always ready to learn.
  - Organising at least 20 hours of work experience during the year
  - Organising at least 20 hours of volunteering this year
  - Keeping driving lessons to afternoons when I don't have a lesson or outside of Sixth Form hours
- 8. I will keep myself safe by complying with signing in/out regulations and wearing my lanyard.
- 9. I will show kindness and respect to both the people and the environment around me.
- I will keep noise to a minimum during study periods and use the Sixth Form Study Spaces for studying.
- 11. When travelling to and from Sixth Form (including if I am off-site during the day) I will do so safely and responsibly by:
  - · Keeping to the speed limit.
  - Keeping my belongings safe.
  - · Acting in a way that reflects well on the Academy around the site.

#### The Family's Agreement



### Systems: Rewards



#### **House Points:**

- One House Point: any positive behaviour in line with the Academy's expectations and values - "I've done more than just avoid getting a behaviour point"
- Two House Points: consistent, repeated or significant positive behaviour in line with the Academy's expectations and values
- Three House Points: a "WOW" reward for a special contribution to the Academy or positive behaviour which goes over and above expectations, or sets a role model example for others to follow

#### House Points: The Sixth House



House Points 'fit' with Sixth Form as we have re-identified ourselves as 'The Sixth House'. This theme helps shape our behaviour curriculum along three themes.



#### Sanctions



Academic Concern - e.g. underperforming in a test

Behaviour Point - e.g. inappropriate dress code, lack of focus or not having the right equipment

Breach of Code Sanction - e.g. repeated BP, swearing, defiance, truancy, vandalism, racism. These hold different tariffs, some are more serious than others.





### Post-16 Bursary



#### **Bursary and Transport**

#### 16-19 Bursary Fund

The Education and Skills Funding Agency (ESFA) allocate the 16-19 Bursary Fund to the Academy.

It is designed to support post-16 students in full time education with the financial challenges of their continuing education, therefore the funds must be used to support students in their learning.

A student must be aged 16 or over but under 19 at 31 August 2023 to be eligible for help from the bursary fund in the 2023 to 2024 academic year.

Students aged 19 or over are only eligible to receive a discretionary bursary if they are continuing on a study programme they began aged 16 to 18 (19+ continuers) or have an Education, Health and Care Plan (EHCP).

#### There are 2 types of 16 to 19 bursary:

- a bursary for students in vulnerable groups
- a discretionary bursary

Students (or their parents/carers) in receipt of the following are eligible for this support. The type of support available varies, depending on which of these categories a student (or parent/carer) is eligible for.

## UCAS vs Target Grades - what is the difference?



UCAS	'FFT' Predicted Grades
Set by teachers based upon their experience of the student's performance in Year 12. Fixed at the end of September, Year 13.	Set by Fisher Family Trust (a national organisation)
Based on knowledge of the student, effort/ATL, current attainment, homework and classwork class tests, assessments etc.	Set using an algorithm that takes into account performance of other similar students in other similar schools (similar = prior attainment, birth month and gender)
Seen by HE providers and used to make suitable offers	A minimum grade that students should be aiming for - these do not define students ability, many students exceed these grades.




- Students can choose up to a maximum of 5 courses to apply for.
- All applications are made online via the UCAS website (<u>www.ucas.com</u>) Admin fee £28.50 (2025).
- Application also includes a personal statement and reference from school or college.





#### **UCAS** application process





- Uni research and exploration: Now through to November 2024
- Internal school / college deadlines: October / November 2024
- UCAS deadline (Oxford/Cambridge, medicine/dentistry/veterinary): 15<sup>th</sup> October
- UCAS deadline (all other courses): 29<sup>th</sup> January 2025
- May 2025 Reply to your offers. Select 'firm' and 'insurance' choices
- August 2025 Find out if you have got your place




### Different types of degree course

Single Subject	Just one subject e.g. Fine Art
Joint Honours	Two subjects, 50% of each e.g. Accounting AND Law
Major/Minor	75% of one, 25% other subject e.g. Psychology with Criminology
Sandwich	A year on a placement (usually 3 <sup>rd</sup> year out of 4 year degree)

#### Finance and funding

- Student loans are available for tuition fees and living costs.
- Nothing to pay back until you are earning over £25,000 per year.
- You only repay 9% of salary over that threshold (i.e. 9p for every £1 extra earnings).
- On a salary of £29,000/year, this equates to £30/month.
- Any outstanding debt is written off by the government after <u>40</u> years.

#### How living cost loans are calculated

Living Arrangements	Minimum Maintenance Loan (non-means tested)	Maximum Maintenance Loan (means tested)
Living at home	£3,698	£8,400
Living away from home, studying outside London	£4,651	£9,978
Living away from home, studying in London	£6,485	£13,022

Students are expected to make up the difference between the maintenance loan amount and their total living costs. This may come from:

The amount of non-repayable funding received can range from a couple of hundreds to thousands of pounds every year.

- Bursary
- Scholarship

Funding is usually based on eligibility criteria. For example:

- Low household income

- Have adult/child dependants
- Studying a particular subject
- Live in a certain area
- Physical or mental health condition/learning difference (DSA)







Extra-curricular activities are those outside of your chosen topic, and unrelated to your studies

Super-curricular is NOT:

- Doing your homework
- Only for those applying for university
- Hours of extra work

Benefits:

- Gives all applications an edge
- Teaches you new skills that you can apply to your lessons
- Helps develop new ideas and opinions





Students can apply for Home Study if their attendance, engagement and behaviour is good. This suits students who may have Private Study lessons Period 1 and 2 on a morning, or no lesson Period 4 or 5 on an afternoon and have independent transport. It is not to be taken mid-day.

Students need to discuss this with their Tutor in the first instance in order to make a sensible proposal. They must then have this approved by their HoY or HoSF.

There are conditions too, such as not missing two consecutive morning registrations.

# Work Experience and Volunteering

Students can continue to take part in work experience or volunteering in Year 13.

They should complete at least two weeks of work experience and volunteering over the two years, many have done that already, but there is no limit.

They can do this during the school day e.g. Wednesday PM or in their own time.
